Treble Clef	A musical symbol that is used for higher pitched notes, at the beginning of the stave.




Prior Learning In Year 1/2, pupils learned:


A crotchet is worth 1 beat. A quaver is worth ½ a beat. 2 quavers are worth 1 beat.



Context - History of Music

Michael Row the Boat Ashore - Gospel Gospel is a style of music usually associated with African American Christian worship. The lyrics praise God and the music is influenced by Spirituals and other West African traditional music. Gospel music has been sung in American churches since the 18th century. Since the mid-20th century, it has become popular across the world.

Gospel is not confined to a specific ensemble or performance type, rather it is the religious message behind it that defines the style. Some famous Gospel musicians and singers include Richard Smallwood, Mary Mary, Thomas A Dorsey and Karen Clark Sheard.

The Dragon Song – Pop

Pop music constantly changes as we change and the world changes. Different countries have their own versions of Pop music, like K-pop from Korea and Britpop from Britain. Pop stars like Beyoncé and Justin Bieber are some of the most famous people in the world today.

Follow Me - Pop

Hip Hop music features a combination of DJing, called 'turntablism', electronic beats, sampling and rapping.
