Voting is an important part of the type of government called **democracy**.

In a democracy, people use voting to choose government leaders.

In an election for a government job, the people who want the job are called candidates.

Candidates often run campaigns before an election. During a campaign, a candidate tries to convince voters that he or she is right for the job.
