Supertato

Home Learning Challenge

Draw a face on a
potato to make your
own Supertato! Take
Supertato around your
house to help out with some
of the jobs, such as tidying
your bedroom and putting
away the dishes. What
other helpful things
can he do?

Use
building bricks
to make a home
for your Supertato.
Think about how tall
and wide it needs to
be to fit Supertato
inside.

When making or eating a meal, discuss which parts of the meal are vegetables and which are healthy for your body. You could also make a healthy snack such as fruit salad or a fruit smoothie.

Talk
about what
your name would be
if you were a superhero
and what special powers
you would have. You
could draw a picture
and bring it into
school.



When shopping in the supermarket, can you count the vegetables you put in your trolley? Can you spot any vegetables in the wrong place?

Make jelly and add in fruit such as blueberries. Does your jelly taste like peas, like the one in the story? What does your jelly taste like?

Home Learning Challenge Sheet

At school we are learning to run. Please help me at home. This is what we need to do to become good at running.

Activities to Support Learning

Running on the Spot

Start by running on the spot. A grown-up will shout out different commands e.g. 'faster' or 'slower'. Listen to the command and change your speed.

Catch Me if You Can

Find an area to play in and set up some safe spots e.g. a slide in the park or a tree in the woods. Try to run between the different safe spots in the area without a grown-up catching you. How many safe spots can you get to?

Up and Down Running

Run around and listen to the instructions from your grown-up. When you hear them shout 'up', jump up high. When you hear them shout 'down', bend down and try to touch the floor.

How to Run:

- Make sure that your head is up and looking where you are running.
- 2. Lean forward slightly.
- 3. To run quicker, pump your arms up and down.
- 4. Make sure your eyes are focusing forwards.

Collect the Coins

With a grown-up, make some pretend pirate coins with numbers 1-10 written on them. Your grown-up will spread out the coins and use different objects as obstacles e.g. soft toys, pillows, old boxes. Next, run around the obstacle course, trying to collect the numbered coins in the correct order.

You could take a photo or draw a picture of you practising the different activities to show us at school. You could tell us about how you have improved your running skills!



People Who Help Us Home Learning Challenge

Learn your address and practise what you would say if you were ever in an emergency and had to call 999. Create your own
emergency vehicle.
Think about its features
- sirens, hosepipes and
ladders, bright colours.
You could make your
vehicles out of old boxes,
bottle top lids and
cardboard tubes.

Make your own People
Who Help Us costume.
Borrow an adult's hat to be
a helmet or a shirt to be a
doctor's coat. Pretend you are
the person who is helping.
What would you do? What
would you say?

Create a thank
you card to send to
someone who has helped
you. You could draw, paint
or use collage to make your
picture. Remember to use
your best writing inside to
say 'thank you' and to
write your name.

the answer!




The Three Little Pigs Home Learning Challenge

out the answer.


Build a model of a

out.


Write down 5 words that rhyme with pig.




Spring and Summer Matching
