The hen keeps the eggs warm by sitting on them. If the hen is not there then the eggs are kept warm inside an incubator.

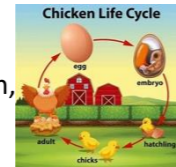
Baby chickens are called chicks. Female chickens are called hens and male chickens are called cockerels.
