Science:

Trees, Plants and Woodland

Key Question:

Do trees die in winter?

Key Vocabulary:

deciduous evergreen garden plant wild plant weed woodland forest shelter root trunk branch

A deciduous tree loses its leaves in autumn and grows new ones in the spring.

An evergreen plant, bush, or tree has leaves for the whole vear.

A garden plant is one we chose to plant and they make our garden look nice. Crocus, rose and daffodil are examples of garden plants.

A wild plant grows in the wild and is not usually planted by a person. Heather and thistles are wild plants that gardeners plant in their garden. Sometimes we remove wild plants that we don't want. We can call these weeds. Many people remove plants such as dandelions from their garden. A woodland is a habitat.

Forests also provide shelter for **animals**, whether it's within the tree roots or trunks, or high up in the branches. Animals that live in forests and woodlands include big animals like bears, moose and deer, and smaller animals like hedgehogs, raccoons and rabbits.

Throwing and Catching – Netball and Rugby

Tag rugby and netball are non-contact sports.

In tag rugby and netball players throw the ball to each other. In tag rugby each player wears a special belt with two tags attached to it.

A player carrying the ball can be "tagged" by having one of the tags pulled off their belt by someone from the other team.

A ball can be passed by bouncing, pushing and throwing. A ball can be caught by making a target with hands and pulling the ball into the chest.

History:

L.S. Lowry and his work

Key Question:

What do Lowry's paintings tell us about pre-war Britain? **Key Vocabulary:**

artist significant industrial NHS represent mill fever terraced housing

Lowry was an artist who lived near Manchester in north west England. He was born in Victorian times and died about 50 years ago. He had a sad childhood because his mother wanted to have a girl. He looked after his mother for much of his life because she was ill.

He had another job as a rent collector for nearly all his working life. He is famous for painting industrial scenes with mills, factories, terraced housing and lots of people in the north of England in the first half of the 20th century. The paintings show what life was like then. For example, most people didn't have cars, many people worked in factories and mills and they didn't have NHS ambulances. The air was smoky because of all the chimneys. People's houses were heated by fires. He painted the things he could see around him such as people going to or from work or people watching a child being taken away by the fever van. He is significant because he chose to represent ordinary people doing ordinary things and he used a special simple style.


