

PREVENT is part of the UK government's counter-terrorism strategy. Its aim is to safeguard individuals from being drawn into extremism or radicalisation. It's about protecting vulnerable people and supporting them before any crime is committed.

Signs to Look Out For



- Sudden changes in behaviour or beliefs.
- Isolation from friends or family
- Use of extremist language or ideology.
- Expressing extremist views or language
- Accessing or sharing harmful online content

Key Points to Know

- Safeguarding: PREVENT is about early help and safeguarding, not criminalising.
- All Forms of Extremism: It addresses all types of extremism, including far-right, Islamist, and other ideologies.
- Vulnerability Focused: It supports individuals who may be at risk due to personal, social, or emotional factors.
- Education Role: Schools play a vital role in identifying concerns and offering support.

What You Can Do

- Talk and Listen: Keep open conversations with your child.
- Stay Informed: Learn about online safety and current issues.
- Raise Concerns Early: Speak to your child's school if you're worried.
- Use Support Services: There are confidential services available to help.

How Schools Support

- Safe Environment: Schools promote values like respect, tolerance, and inclusion.
- Staff Training: Teachers are trained to spot signs of concern and know how to respond.
- Curriculum: Pupils learn about critical thinking, online safety, and respectful debate.
- Support Pathways: Schools work with families and local safeguarding teams to offer help.
